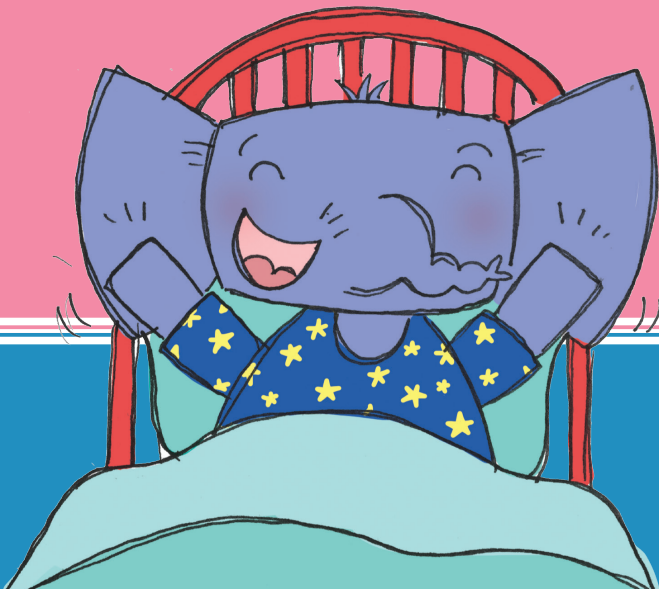

“Are you not afraid of what Gramps will say about you wearing an apron?”

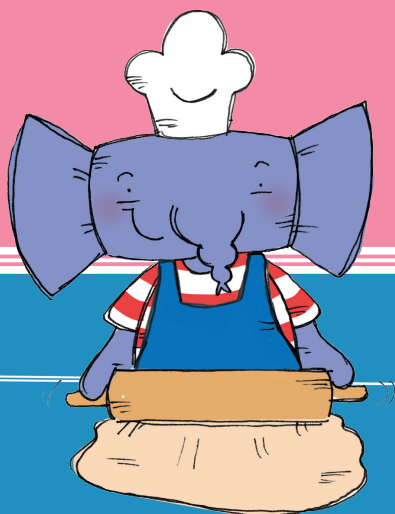

Tippie watches Gran while she divides the rest of the dough into eight pieces.

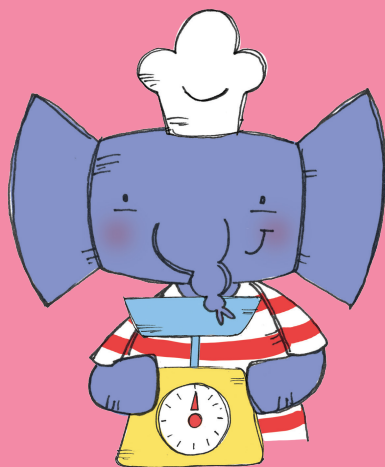
"May I weigh each piece of dough, Gran?"

"Yes, I know you can learn maths all day long."

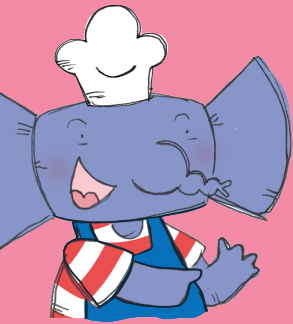
"I want to make sure each piece of dough weighs the same. Then I want to add the weight of the eight pieces and get the total weight."
